Once upon a time, there was a faithful little oven...

In April of 2010, when Manna Cafe was in its infancy, Kenny purchased a used convection oven to cook our Mobile Cafe meals. For seven years, this oven has done its job like a champ. At roughly 24,000 meals per year for 7 years, it has cooked more than **160 thousand** meals!

Recently, however, our trusty friend has broken down twice. This is alarming, since every single meal we serve (on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays) depends on it. Unfortunately, once a commercial oven starts breaking down, it's time for an update, especially since some of our clients

have told us that they count on us for their only hot meal of the day.

Our goal is to purchase a double-stack oven (2 ovens stacked atop one another so that if one acts up, the other is unaffected). An oven like this could feasibly last 15-20 years. We need \$6,100 to purchase and install it. A word from Kenny

There's a conversation that's been rehashed over and over for the past seven years. As Manna Café's founder, I think it's time to address the issue with you, our valued supporters and donors. The matter involves our food rescue program and our efforts to get fresh produce into the hands of our clients before it goes bad. We get fruits and vegetables from three sources: 1) by sending our refrigerated trucks to local grocery stores to pick up their surplus, 2) from farmers and gardeners who bring their surplus to us, and 3) by purchasing it from Second Harvest Food Bank in Nashville (after they've purchased or rescued it themselves).



Each year, we give away 1.5 million pounds of food; almost a million of that is rescued and includes everything from canned goods, meat, and pasta to milk, cheese, bread, and produce. A major challenge is getting the fresh items—i.e., produce—to our clients quickly enough (since much of

it has a very short "window"). Add to that the fact that we often receive bags of apples, potatoes, etc., that include just *one* bad apple or potato, and it's tough to do a perfect job.

Before produce is put into a client's food box, we do our best (with the help of volunteers) to sort through everything and remove anything that's no longer palatable. (And sometimes, especially during the summer, produce will expire in the short time between sorting and distributing it.) Every day we handle thousands of pounds of food while serving between 150 and 200 clients. Try as we might, it's impossible to guarantee that no one ever receives a piece of spoiled fruit. During the past few months, there are times we've been so cautious that almost one-third of rescued produce has gone to the livestock farmer who collects our rejects. But we still occasionally get a complaint about bad produce.

As the leader of Manna Café, I'm constantly battling with where the line between "reasonably cautious" ends and "excessively cautious" begins. I don't want to be careless and distribute food that can't be used, but I also don't want to throw away good food by being too meticulous.

The only way to guarantee that no one will ever receive inedible produce is to stop rescuing food altogether and let it go to the landfills like it did before the food rescue



program began. But that would mean we'd have no more access to the hundreds of thousands of pounds of nutritious food that currently feeds hungry people—and I'm not willing to do that. So we're asking for your prayers and support. Please help us educate the community as to how the food rescue process works. Help us spread the word that we have a phenomenally successful and valuable food pantry in place, but we need a little patience when something slips through the cracks. In the meantime, with your continued support and encouragement, my team and I will keep rescuing food and serving as many Clarksvillians as we can.
